A Long Time Coming

Stoddert Celebrates Phase I Additions

n the fall of 2022, DCPS created a School Improvement Team (SIT) for the Stoddert addition to provide feedback on design concepts and to assist with sharing information about the addition with the broader community. The SIT is composed of Stoddert parents, teachers, nonteaching staff, and representatives from community organizations, specifically the ANC3B and the Glover Park Citizens' Association. The general contractor, DC-based Chiaramonte Construction Company, has done various DC school renovations and expansions, such as Woodson High, Eastern High, the Whittier Campus and the University of the District of Columbia, UDC. The architect is Shinberg Levinas. The project costs taxpayers \$26.6 million (updated from the original \$16 million) and the entire budget was approved in the DC Capital Improvement Plan allocated over the three years, 2024–26.

The last expansion in 2009, which added 47,000 square feet, resulted in the school being near capacity almost as soon as the project was finished in 2011 due to the exploding student population in Glover Park at the time. According to Mayor Bowser, the state-of-the-art learning facilities enable the Stoddert "Wolves" to learn in world-class educational environments. "Our students deserve a strong and joyful start to the school year. We're grateful to have strong school communities, like the one here at Stoddert, that come together every day to make students feel safe, loved, and challenged," said Bowser.

Phase I of the Stoddert Elementary School expansion, the East-End Classroom Addition, delivered 16,554 square feet of new space, including 10 modern classrooms equipped with built-in shelving, cubbies, sinks, interactive presentation boards, and flexible furniture designed for collaborative learning. The addition replaces eight outdated modular classrooms that were used for over 12 years and took up valuable staff parking spaces. The addition also includes a new playground for Stoddert's two Pre-K classrooms and features geothermal energy performance improvements. "As one of DCPS' highest-achieving schools, Stoddert's new addition will further empower students to live up to their reputation for excellence," said DCPS Chancellor, Dr. Lewis D. Ferebee.

Environmental concerns were always top of mind during construction. An enclosed rain garden was created next to the Pre-K playground and all historic trees were checked for safety and well-preserved, including the 200-year-old oak tree. New cherry trees and native plants were added along the perimeter of the retaining walls and drainage has been

improved. The Stoddert Garden was preserved and now has better access to water and other amenities.

Phase II of the project is now under way. The West-End Cafeteria Addition will add 7,222 square feet for a new kitchen, cafeteria,

bathrooms, service elevator and overhang for parking. The existing cafeteria in the middle of the school will be converted to six administrative offices and two small meeting rooms. This design will move traffic away from the student access points to enter the school and will ease delivery truck and janitorial staff access by ensuring the back of the school is well-planned. The project is expected to be completed in summer 2026.

During the construction phase, the build team temporarily used the DPR field space adjacent to Stoddert with access to the road added to maneuver materials and equipment. With the end of phase 1 and start of phase 2, the construction team has moved to the parking lot where the temporary classrooms once stood. Staff are now using the gravel lot on the DPR field. Once all projects are completed, the grass will be replanted and returned to working order. Measures have been put in place to mitigate environmental concerns, debris and heavy traffic, and

loss of parking spots in the neighborhood such, as a temporary truck wash for the machinery coming in and out and barriers along the park land adjacent to the school.

It is natural that there will be questions as we embark upon the final phase of the project. Stoddert leadership, along with the SIT for the Stoddert addition, continue to work with DCPS and Department of Genteral Services to shape the project and gain a more complete understanding of the timeline and impact on the Stoddert community. 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GPCA September 2025 Meeting

Lt. Paul Johnson of MPD presented the police report, noting that during the previous month there had been 9 reportable crimes, including thefts from CVS and residents' porches. He encouraged residents to use the Amazon lockers at 2D at 3320 Idaho Avenue NW for package deliveries, to deter package thefts.

Jarrett Ferrier noted that some Glover Park residents have been complaining about electrical wires in disarray. Kendall Gibson, Ward 3 Manager at the Mayor's Office of Community Relations and Services, asked residents to report any problems to her at Kendall.gibson1@ dc.gov.

Kate Dean of Glover Park Main Street encouraged residents to go to Glover Park Art All Night on September 12, and also encouraged everyone to fly DC flags.

Jarrett Ferrier reminded participants of the paper-shredding event on September 20, noting that residents will be limited to two boxes each. Jarrett also reminded residents that the September edition of the Glover Park Gazette is available online, as well as in hard copy at Guy Mason, the Georgetown Library, Ace Hardware, Bonjon Rumi, and Rocklands.

Jeff Russell reminded participants to <u>buy tickets</u> for the Friends of Guy Mason Fall Gala, taking place on Friday, October 17, at the Glover Park Hotel. Tickets are available <u>here</u>.

ANC3B Meeting Highlights September 2025

- Police Report. Lt. Johnson reported 11 thefts in the past 30day period, four of which were at the CVS. Overall, 7 of the 11 crimes were reported online. Lt. Johnson urged people to call the police while the crime is in process or has just happened so that MPD can send officers out immediately rather than make an online report. Reporting in person gives MPD a much better chance at catching a perpetrator and collecting fresh evidence. For example, 3 of the 4 thefts at CVS were committed by the same person. It is CVS corporate policy to not report a theft until after the perpetrator has left which they often do online. If the crime was reported in person, MPD would have a better chance at apprehending the suspect. There is good video of the suspect, but they were long gone before MPD was alerted. The Lieutenant was also asked how policing has changed recently. He said there have been a lot of changes, some good, some bad. In the Second District, regular police activities have not changed much. The Federal entities are working with the Crime Suppression Teams. Those officers go out with the FBI, America's Test Kitchen, ICE, the Park Police and the Secret Service. They do a lot of warrants and searches as well as traffic stops, and they respond to level 1 offences like robberies.
- Discussion and Resolution on Lifting Rush Hour Restrictions on Westside of Wisconsin Avenue, NW from 36th Street to Calvert Street. Commissioner Turmail introduced a resolution clarifying the resolution 3B passed in May regarding streateries. That resolution urged DDOT to continue existing streateries and allow for new ones to be developed. DDOT asked for more specificity regarding parking restrictions. This amended resolution urges DDOT to waive all rush hour restrictions on the west side of Wisconsin Avenue between 36th Street and Calvert Street. A motion was made to approve the resolution. It was seconded and passed unanimously.

- Discussion of Persistent Water Leak in Public Space at 3101 New Mexico Avenue, NW. Commissioner Rodriguez discussed a water leak in public space at 3101 New Mexico that was first reported to DC Water in February 2024. DC Water did finally come out to evaluate the issue, determined it was on DC Water's "side of the meter," and that they were responsible for fixing it. It is still not fixed, and people are growing concerned that if it is not fixed before winter sets in that the problem will create hazardous conditions in that area. Commissioner Rodriguez has tried consistently to locate a project manager to get some definitive schedule but has not been able to do so. Owen Cox from MOCRS has a contact at DC Water and will reach out to them. It was also suggested that Commissioner Rodriguez reach out to Councilmember Frumin's office.
- Discussion and Resolution Condemning Federal Overreach in DC Policing and Demand for Return of Local Funds. Commissioner Lavezzo introduced the subject resolution calling for Congress to end Federal troop deployment in DC and the return of \$1 billion of DC tax money that they withheld from the FY 25 budget. The deployment is in direct violation of the DC Home Rule Act, which places control of the police force with the DC government. A motion was made to approve the resolution. It was seconded and passed unanimously.
- Commissioner Rodriguez was asked by a constituent to have a bus stop restored for the C85 at New Mexico and Cathedral. He has contacted WMATA. They are receptive to the idea but the request has to go through the full WMATA internal process.

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Real Estate Update

Market Correction

Earlier this year, I reported on increased inventory. Now with three quarters of the year complete, we can reflect and compare with 2023 and 2024. Below are a few observations:





Figure 1. Average Close Price and List Price by Year for Houses.

- Prices are coming down. Average list prices and final close prices have decreased (Figures 1 and 2).
- The list price to sold price ratio (average) is decreasing (Figure 3) but still above 1 for houses.
- Increased Inventory–The number of houses sold year-to-date has exceeded the total number of houses sold annually in the past two years
- Some homes are taking a lot longer to sell While the average days on market for properties that have sold appear to be relatively consistent year-over-year, our current average days on market for active listings is over 40 days for houses and 80 days for condos and co-ops.

There are still three months left in the year with several factors that are likely to impact our market. Interest rates are the lowest we have seen all year and improve affordability. This may compel more buyers to submit offers. However, the federal government shutdown and layoff of government employees bring a sense of uncertainty. As we are now in the fall season with more inventory than in recent years, it is difficult to predict how the year will end. Look for the updates in coming *Gazette* issues.

Notes on the data used:

1. I use the contract date and not the date of settlement in these calculations. While the two dates are usually ~4 weeks apart, I chose contract date for this analysis because this is a better indicator of buyer sentiment. Afterall, it is at the contract signature date that the price is negotiated and

not on the date of settlement. 2. Raw data was extracted from BRIGHT MLS and COMPASS.com.

Figure 3. Average Close Price to List Price by Year for Houses.




Figure 4. Days on Market by Year (Houses).




Figure 5. Days on Market by Year (Condos/Co-ops).
