A Piece of London, A Tribute to Those Lost on September 11

The Story of the Guy Mason Memorial Bench

Tucked among the row of Cornelian Cherry trees on the north side of the Guy Mason Recreation Center sits a bench unlike any other in Glover Park— a cast-iron seat with elaborate, fanciful camel-shaped end supports, cast an ocean away in Kent, England, and given to Washington, D.C. as a memorial to the victims of September 11, 2001.

An Unlikely Gift from Sittingbourne

The bench was donated by the Littlewood and LeBeau families of Sittingbourne, Kent, in the United Kingdom. It is a replica of the ornamental benches that line the Thames Embankment in the City of London, and it was cast by SLB Foundry, a family-run business founded in Sittingbourne in 1842.

By 2001, SLB Foundry was winding down its operations, and one bench remained unsold in the warehouse. According to the family, it was on that Tuesday morning in September when Mr. Littlewood heard the news of the attacks and resolved to find a way to honor the victims and their families. He and the LeBeau family decided the last bench their foundry would ever produce should go to Washington, D.C.

Mr. Littlewood himself spent painstaking hours hand-painting the heavy cast iron and then took on the considerable task of finding companies willing to underwrite the cost of shipping the bench across the Atlantic to Washington.

Dedication Day

The bench was formally dedicated at a ceremony held by the D.C. Department of Parks and Recreation on Wednesday, March 29, 2006, with Mr. and Mrs. Fred Littlewood in attendance. At that ceremony,

Parks Department staff installed two plaques on the bench. One dedicates the bench as a gift to the people of Washington, D.C. The second bears a verse from Laurence Binyon's poem "For the Fallen," words that have offered comfort to the bereaved since the First World War:

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old, Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning. We will remember them."

At the time, Friends of Guy Mason joined the Department of Parks and Recreation in thanking the Littlewood and LeBeau families for their generous and heartfelt gift, one that has, ever since, offered neighbors a quiet place to sit, rest, and remember.

Marking 25 Years

This September marks the 25th anniversary of the September 11th attacks, and the community is invited to gather once more at the site of the newly refurbished memorial bench.

Join your neighbors for a ceremony marking the 25th anniversary Friday, September 11 at 5:00 p.m. At the memorial bench, Guy Mason Recreation Center. The bench has been refurbished ahead of this milestone anniversary, ensuring that this unique piece of London craftsmanship, and the message of remembrance it carries, will continue to greet visitors to Guy Mason for years to come. Glover Park residents are encouraged to attend and take a moment, as generations before them have, to reflect on the meaning of the Littlewood and LeBeau families' gift.

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ANC3B Meeting Reports for June and July 2026

Police Report. Lieutenant Johnson reported 9 crimes in the past 30 days in 3B. Eight were property crimes and one was a violent crime. The violent crime was an assault with a deadly weapon (knife) in the 2500 block of 41st Street NW. The case was closed with an arrest. The property crimes included 3 thefts from auto, 4 general thefts (3 were package thefts) and 1 motor vehicle theft. The latter was an unsecured motorcycle stolen from the 4100 block of W Street NW. Commissioner Lavezzo asked for increased traffic enforcement for the stop sign at 39th and Tunlaw Road NW. Several incidents of cars running the stop sign have resulted in both bicyclists and pedestrians almost being hit especially during morning and evening rush hours.

Update from Glover Park Main Street, Kate Dean, Executive Director and Brandi Backus, Program Manager. Kate Dean gave an update on GPMS. The main news is that the Glover Park Alliance (GPA) which holds the grant for GPMS has also been awarded the grant for Woodley Park Main Street. To be more inclusive, GPA is being re-branded the “Local City Collective,” which includes both Glover Park Main Street and Woodley Park Main Street. Other news is that the office is moving from the Launch space at 2201 Wisconsin Avenue NW to the Launch space at the Watergate because the space at 2201 has been closed and the building is being converted to “luxury apartments.” Kate introduced Brandi Backus who started work for the Alliance in March. Brandi described the project to install 10 new tree boxes along Wisconsin Avenue and Hall Place in Glover Park: 2 will be by the CVS, 5 by Holy Rood Cemetery, and 3 on the east side between the former Rite Aid and the hardware store. Commissioner Turmail asked about the status of the former Town Hall space. Kate said there have been several infrastructure issues that have now been addressed and a prospective restaurant tenant is moving forward and plans to open in that space. Carol Vilsack asked about the process for giving grants to businesses and a list of grant recipients. Kate explained there is a grant call once a year. She also said that the websites for GPMS and WPMS are being re-designed and a list of grant recipients will be included when the sites launch.

Request for ANC Letter of Support for Documentary Screening at Guy Mason Recreation Center. Steve Mabley from Free DC said his group would like to show the documentary, “Last Battlefront,” a film about DC’s Home Rule and statehood effort throughout history. They would like to air film on the grounds of Guy Mason in either July 18 or July 25 from about 8:30 p.m.–10:30 p.m. To use the grounds, they need a permit from DC Parks and Recreation. The permit application must include a letter of support from the ANC. Free DC is a 501(c)(4) and a non political organization. Commissioner Turmail asked for a motion to write a letter of support to DPR. It was seconded and passed unanimously.

Update. Che Demczuk from the Mayor’s Office of Community Resources and Service said there would be a roll-off event in Ward 1 in LeDroit Park on 6/13. The pride parade is scheduled for 6/20. It will start at 14th and P Streets NW and end at Freedom Plaza. Also, the 34th national BBQ battle will be on 6/28 on Pennsylvania Avenue NW between 3rd and 7th Streets.

July 9, 2026

Police Report. Lieutenant Johnson reported 12 crimes in the past 30 days, up from 9 for the same period a year ago. They included 3 thefts from auto and 9 general thefts, two of which were packages

stolen from porches and most of the remainder were thefts at CVS. No violent crimes occurred in the past 30 days.

General Discussion of Issues Regarding the D96 Bus Route and Service. Commissioner Rodriguez opened the discussion with an explanation of the removal of the bus stop for the D96 at New Mexico and Cathedral. The bus stop is on Cathedral close to the intersection. Because it is so close, it is causing traffic to snarl especially during rush hour because traffic backs up into the intersection behind the stopped bus. As a result, WMATA has removed the stop from the D96 route. It has also removed the D96 stop on the north side because buses were not able to move over easily to make the left turn onto New Mexico from Cathedral. Commissioner Lane said other problems that 3B has heard about is that buses are bunching especially during rush hours and that buses are now running more than 30 minutes apart. Commissioner Rodriguez said that he and other 3B commissioners have attempted to contact WMATA officials several times to discuss these issues and attend an ANC 3B meeting but have not had any success. Commissioner Lavezzo commented that whenever we have tried to contact them more broadly about issues with the buses that WMATA has not communicated openly. Commissioner Rodriguez said 3B would continue to try to get WMATA to address these issues.

Notice of Public Hearing on Kahama West LLC application for a new medical cannabis license at 2208 Wisconsin Avenue NW. Commissioner Rodriguez introduced former Commissioner Jackie Blumenthal who has done research on the applicant for a medical cannabis license at 2208 Wisconsin Avenue. Ms. Blumenthal said that she has extensive experience working with liquor and cannabis license applications on the GP Wisconsin Avenue strip and stressed that where owners are respectful and responsible in the neighborhood, there are seldom any problems. She has concerns about this applicant. The applicant is the brother of a man, who along with his partner, owns three other medical marijuana retail stores which is the maximum number allowed in DC. The original owners want to start a cultivation center and therefore must shed some of their retail operations. Their plan is to transfer two of their retail licenses to Kahama West who is the applicant for the license at 2208 Wisconsin. According to transcripts of previous ABCA hearings on this license transfer request, Mr. West does not have experience running this type of business and ABCA could not determine his fitness to run the business. As such, the concern is that it may be a “straw transfer”—meaning the original owners would run it and Mr. West would only be the frontman. A further concern is that one of the retail stores run by the two original owners and located in Georgetown was so disruptive to the neighborhood that it was shut down twice by MPD at the request of nearby neighbors. Given these concerns, Commissioner Rodriguez said that ANC 3B needs to ask questions about the applicant’s ability to run this type of business and be responsible to and respectful of the neighborhood. A medical cannabis store can and did operate successfully in Glover Park for several years and that was due in large part because the owner was responsible and worked with the neighborhood. A motion was made and seconded to protest the license application with ABCA and to have either Commissioner Turmail or his designee represent ANC 3B at the ABCA hearing on Monday, August 31. The motion passed unanimously. A letter will be sent to ABCA by the August 10 deadline informing them of ANC 3B’s intention to protest.

The Glover Park Archeological Museum One Hundred Years Ago

In March of 1926, when the apartment building at Wisconsin Avenue and W Place began to advertise, its location was still described as “Georgetown Heights,” near Naval Observatory, 3507 W Place.” That same spring, building permits were issued to erect “twenty-two 2-story brick dwellings” at what is now 2424 to 2466 Tunlaw Road. On September 4, 1926, Benjamin H. Gruver announced the completion of the first of those new houses, and invited inspection of the exhibit home, at (what is now) 2430 Tunlaw Road, in his new subdivision called Glover Park. (*Evening Star*, March 13, May 29, September 4, 1926.

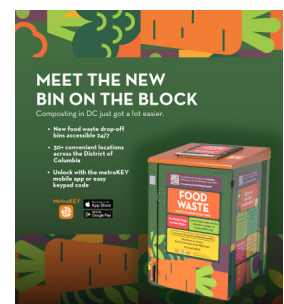

Supporting Domestic Workers

Do you hire a house cleaner, nanny, or home care worker? Many of us rely on the support of domestic workers to make our homes safe and clean for ourselves as well as children, elders, and people with disabilities so that our households run smoothly. Did you know that in 2022, a law was passed to make sure that these workers have some employment protections?

When you think about your best paid work experiences, things that might come to mind are having a great boss, good benefits, or equitable pay. These are all powerful ways employers can show how much they value their employees' work, and these can be extended to those who work in your home.

Historically, domestic workers like nannies and house cleaners have been left out of policies that protect workers, even minimum wage and sick time protections, but the Domestic Workers Bill of Rights changed that in DC. In fact, DC is a policy leader across the country when it comes to protecting workers—only 12 states and three cities guarantee these kinds of worker protections. Domestic workers were at the forefront of passing this policy, and through the National Domestic Workers Alliance, they continue to lead the implementation of the policy.

Of course, unlike other jobs, employers of domestic workers don't have HR departments, and that's where [Hand in Hand: the Domestic Employers Network](#) can help. Hand in Hand is a national network that supports employers to have all the information and resources they need to successfully implement local policies like this one and answer individual questions.

Here's what you need to know about protections domestic workers have in DC:

If you hire someone for five hours per month or more, you're required to have a written [contract](#) with them. This document lays out basic information about the job, such as how and when the worker is paid, how they accrue sick time, and what they can expect from the job. Hand in Hand also recommends holding regular check-in conversations (on the clock!) to assess how the job might change over time.

Domestic workers are also guaranteed minimum wage, sick time, and paid family leave—the same as all other workers in the city. Hand in Hand recommends paying a family-sustaining wage, since most domestic workers are also heads of their households with dependents.

Overtime pay protections apply to domestic workers, and they should be paid 1.5 times their hourly rate for any hours worked over 40 in a week.

Workers employed more than half-time (240 hours per quarter, or about 20 hours weekly must have access to workers' compensation if they are injured on the job.

Like most other workers, domestic workers are protected from



discrimination, harassment, and retaliation.

Many of these protections simply level the playing field for domestic workers, and you may already be following most of them. Others, like the written contract, are new for many employers, and can take some time to absorb and complete. Some employers find contracts confusing or difficult to create, and some workers may be reluctant to agree to one.

There are many reasons for this, and Hand in Hand is here to help. Contracts have benefits for both workers and employers because they clarify the working relationship for both parties. One employer explained the relief she felt upon hiring someone who brought a contract to her interview: "I was so grateful for this because I simply had never employed anyone and didn't know what to do. She had received this template from a community organization, and it helped her not only advocate for herself, but educate me as well."

Most employers want to do right by the people who are caring for their loved ones and their homes, but until the passage of the Domestic Workers Bill of Rights, people were relying on their best guesses and input from friends and neighbors to determine what doing right looked like.

Now, with the support of local organizations and government agencies, employers and domestic workers can use the provisions in the Domestic Workers Bill of Rights to be more explicit about their working relationships in ways that benefit both parties. Of course, that doesn't mean it's always easy to make changes to an existing working relationship. If you're not sure how to start the conversation or take the next step, know that you are not alone.

Hand in Hand has [resources](#) to help you navigate the process of hiring, employment, and developing contracts, and we are also running a pilot program to support employers and employees through contract development. 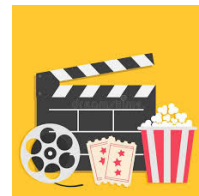
